


Author Spotlight: Clare Helen Welsh





<u>The Perfect Shelter</u> (illustrated by Asa Gilland) A beautiful, powerful and uplifting story, exploring the complicated emotions we feel when someone we love is diagnosed with a serious illness and seeking emotional shelter during difficult times.

<u>How Rude</u> and <u>How Selfish</u> (illustrated by Olivier Tallec) Dot and Duck are two friends with a lot to learn. These stories initiate conversations about sharing, solving problems and how to play nicely with friends. They are also great fun to act out and read aloud.



Are they white with holes for eyes?


Are they hard to see?


Then the train comes to an unexpected halt. A tree has fallen across the track and there's no way the guard can move it on his own.


It's a race against time and the passengers will need to use all their talents to get the train moving again. Can they reach their dreams before midnight?

Christmas for Benji has lost its magic.


This year, his family can't afford a tree, or even a turkey. But then he stumbles upon the most extraordinary department store, where polar bears talk and the presents are out of this world.



Bastien Bonlivre is a boy with a big imagination, determined to finish the story his parents started, left to him in a red notebook.





But when she goes to a new school with a singing Santa backpack and first day Christmas cards (during a heatwave in September!), she realises not everyone shares her enthusiasm for spreading cheer. In fact, when the neighbours try to remove the Carrolls from the street and Holly discovers a group of children that may not get a Christmas at all, her snowglobe world begins to crack.

Julia and the Shark Kiran Millwood Hargrave

The shark was beneath my bed, growing large as the room, large as the lighthouse, rising from unfathomable depths until it ripped the whole island from its roots. The bed was a boat, the shark a tide, and it pulled me so far out to sea I was only a speck, a spot, a mote, a dying star in an unending sky...

But when her mother's obsession threatens to submerge them all, Julia finds herself on an adventure with dark depths and a lighthouse full of hope... For readers 9+





The Book Cat Polly Faber


This is a classic wartime tale of a (real!) cat who made his home at the Faber offices and decided he'd never leave.

Morgan is a young orphan who lives off scavenging - until he finds a cosy home at a famous London publishing house. Over time he learns a trade - and soon becomes the very best book cat in the business. And then the Blitz begins. Morgan finds himself training up twenty odd kittens to be book cats, and then there is the small matter of secretly evacuating them out of London. Happily, Morgan has a plan.


Set in war-torn London, charmingly illustrated, and full of heart and verve.


Mrs Merrills recommends: The Phantom Tollbooth

This is my favourite book of all time!




Full of twists and turns, this hilarious book is great for Key Stage 2.
