With his help, Aarti hopes to remember who she really is ... and perhaps find a way home.





#### What's new: EYFS and KS1 Fiction




A thought-provoking book to help children understand the idea of ever-changing emotions.


#### The Comet Joe Todd-Stanton

This story explores how this can affect a child's sense of belonging, but also how it can open them up to new and wonderful experiences.




The Duck Who Didn't Like Water Steve Small


A wise, funny fable about how we don't need to like the same things to find our perfect pal.

#### The Queen in the Cave Júlia Sardà




This is a riveting and atmospheric picture book that will surprise and enthral young readers and dreamers.




#### The Ship of Cloud and Stars Amy Raphael




#### The Last Firefox Lee Newbery

But when a ghost child beckons Nisha to sit under its boughs, and promises her Amma's life in return for three truths, its pull proves irresistible ...




#### The Secret of Haven Point Lisette Auton

#### Frindleswylde Natalia & Lauren O'Hara







I really enjoy mystery and detective stories. I think it probably stems from my mathematical thinking and enjoyment of solving puzzles.






